- 1. Complete the registration form.
- 2. Provide two proofs of residency (Ex. Current utility bill, vehicle registration, rent/lease

mortgage agreement, driver's license, voter's precinct id, property tax receipt, Homestead Exemption form)

- 3. Provide a copy of student's birth certificate, Social Security Card, and Health Record/121 Form.
- 4. Provide withdrawal information from last school attended by student
- 5. Provide verification of the most recent earned grades
- 6. Provide proof of identification for Parent or Guardian.

Why Reading Just 20 Minutes a Day Can Help Your Child Succeed in School

Reading Is "Brain Food"

Our brains develop as we "feed" them with experiences. The experience of reading (whether you're the reader or the one being read to) activates and "exercises" many of the areas of the brain. The visual cortex works as your eyes track the words on the page and look at the illustrations. Your memory makes connections between what you already know and the topic of the story. You integrate new information learned through reading further strengthening and growing your network of knowledge.

Reading Improves Academic Performance

There is a strong correlation between a child's ability to read and his or her academic performance. Because so much of our schooling relies on our abilities to read, children must have strong reading skills to succeed and thrive in school.

Reading Just Makes "Cents"

For every year that a person spends reading (either independently or being read aloud to), his or her lifetime earning potential goes up considerably. For a time investment of approximately 87 hours a year (20 minutes a day for 5 days a week), you can increase your child's ability to support him or herself in the future considerably.
