# Parent Tips Reading Strategies for Rising Kindergarten to Fifth Grade Students

- \* Encourage your Scholar to select the books that interest them.
- \* Whenever possible, your child should read at least 20 minutes per day.
- Predicting: Look at the cover of the book and talk about what the book might be about. Ask your child who they think the characters might be and what might take place in this story?
- Read books over and over again. Children need practice with fluency and expression.
- Build reading accuracy. As your child is reading aloud, point out words he/she misses and help him/her read words correctly. If you stop to focus on a missed word, have your child go back and read the entire sentence again.
- Build reading comprehension. Talk with your child about what he/she is reading. Ask about new words and what they mean. Ask your child to tell you who, what, where, when, why, and how. Ask about the characters, places, and events that took place.
- Have conversations with your child during meal times, riding in the car, watching television, playing, and other times when you are together. Children learn words more easily when they hear them spoken often.
- Read together every day. Spend time talking about stories, pictures, and words.
- Be your child's best advocate. Stay informed about your child's progress in reading. Talk with your child's teacher and principal about expectations, assignments, tests, and work with them to help your child learn.
- Model reading and writing for your child. Be an active reader and writer. Children learn habits from watching those around them.
- Visit the library often. Story Time, computers, and other resources are available for the entire family!

# To help you remember what you have read, consider doing one or more of these projects for sharing with others in August when you return to school.

- Draw a picture of or describe your favorite character.
- Draw a picture of or describe your favorite part.
- Make a poster of your favorite scene.
- Design a new book cover.
- Create a puppet of one or more of the characters.
- Design a bookmark to go with one of the books.
- Create a new ending for one of the books.
- Write a description of the main character from one of the books.
- Develop a comic strip summary for one of the books.
- Write a letter to the main character of a book.
- Write a letter to the author about what you did or did not like about one of the books.
